
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How to Use...

Why Daily Devotions Matter

- Spiritual Growth It helps children develop a strong foundation in God's Word.
- Family Connection It creates a dedicated time for meaningful conversation and bonding.
- Moral Guidance It provides wisdom and direction for making godly choices.
- **Prayer Habit** It teaches children to rely on God in all circumstances. By making family devotions a daily priority, parents can instill lifelong faith

habits in their children and create a home centered on God's Word.

Parents Using Family Devotional Effectively

Here's a simple guide for parents on how to incorporate devotionals into everyday life:

1. Set a Consistent Time

- Choose a time that works best for your family's schedule—morning, mealtime, or bedtime.
- Consistency helps make devotionals a habit, creating a special routine for your family.
- Start with follow-up what was learned before and how it was applied.

2. Read the Bible Verse Together

• Discuss what the verse means in simple terms and how it applies to everyday life.

3. Engage with the Devotional Story

- Read the short story or example provided.
- Relate the story to real-life situations your child may encounter.

4. Make the Faith Connection

- Help children understand how the Bible connects to their lives.
- Explain how Scripture reveals God's love, guidance, and His plan for salvation.
- Encourage them to see the Bible as more than just words—it's a message from God.

5. Discuss It

• Use Discussion question to deepen what we learn.

6. Pray Together

• Use the provided prayer or let each family member pray in their own words.

7. Application to our lives

• Encourage your child to put what they've learned into action

Disciples, Doctrine and Death

Bible Verse

"Jesus said to the people who believed in him, 'You are truly my disciples if you remain faithful to my teachings." – John 8:31 (NLT)

Story

Mia loved **baking with her grandma**. At first, she didn't know how to measure ingredients or mix things properly, but over time, she learned by **watching and following instructions**.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about what it means to be a **disciple of Jesus**.

- A disciple is a learner and follower of Jesus. Jesus' disciples listened to His teachings and tried to live like Him.
- Doctrine is teaching from the Bible that helps us understand who God is and how to live for Him.
- **Death is the separation of the body and soul**—our bodies stay on earth, but our souls continue into eternity.

Mia tilted her head. "So, being a **disciple** means we **learn about Jesus** and **follow His teachings**, just like I learned to bake?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "The **Bible teaches us doctrine**—God's truth—so we can **grow in** faith and live the way He wants us to."

Dad continued, "And when we **understand God's truth**, we don't have to be afraid of death. The Bible says that **death is when our soul separates from our body**, but for those who follow Jesus, it means being **with Him forever!**"

Mia smiled. "So, we learn from Jesus, follow His teachings, and trust Him for eternity?"

"Exactly," Mom said. "And as we **study God's Word**, we become **stronger disciples** and grow in our **understanding of His truth.**"

Faith Connection

A disciple is someone who learns from and follows Jesus. Doctrine is teaching from the Bible that helps us understand God's truth. Death is not the end for those who follow Christ—it is the separation of the body and soul, leading believers into eternity with Jesus.

Discuss It What does it mean to **be a disciple of Jesus** in everyday life? How can learning **Bible doctrine** help us grow in faith?

Prayer Dear Jesus, thank You for **teaching me how to follow You**. Help me to **learn from Your Word**, grow as Your disciple, and trust in Your promises for eternity. Amen.

Live It This week, take time to **learn more about Jesus** by reading a **Bible story** or memorizing a verse. Think about how you can **live as His disciple** by following His example!

Apostles, Prophets, and Angels

Bible Verse

"...No prophecy in Scripture ever came from the prophet's own understanding, or from human initiative. No, those prophets were moved by the Holy Spirit, and they spoke from God." – 2 Peter 1:20-21 (NLT)

Story

Noah's teacher asked him to **deliver a special message** to the principal. "I'm trusting you to bring this exactly as I wrote it," she said.

That night, during family devotions, Noah's dad read about how **God uses messengers** to bring His Word to people.

- An apostle is a special messenger sent by God to spread the gospel. The disciples were Jesus' apostles, sharing His truth with the world.
- A prophet is someone chosen by God to speak for Him in a special way through the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Bible, prophets helped people understand God's plan.
- Angels are spiritual beings created by God. They serve Him by delivering messages, protecting His people, and praising Him.

Noah tilted his head. "So, apostles, prophets, and angels all **deliver God's messages** in different ways?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "Apostles were sent to **spread the Good News**, prophets **spoke through the Holy Spirit**, and angels **carry out God's will** in special ways."

Dad added, "Just like your teacher trusted you to **deliver an important message**, God trusts **His messengers** to bring His truth to the world."

Noah grinned. "That means we can be **messengers for God too** by sharing His love with others!"

Faith Connection

God uses different **messengers** to share His truth. **Apostles** spread the gospel, **prophets** spoke for God through the **Holy Spirit**, and **angels** serve God as spiritual beings. Today, **God calls us to share His love and truth with others, too!**

Discuss It

Why do you think God uses **different kinds of messengers**? How can you be a **messenger for God** today?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for using **apostles**, **prophets**, **and angels** to share Your message. Help me to **be a messenger for You** by sharing Your love and truth with others. Amen.

Live It

This week, find one way to share God's message—by encouraging a friend, sharing a Bible verse, or praying for someone. Remember, God calls you to be His messenger too!

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These devotions are built around Bible Fact-Pak 10-point questions. To use them effectively, keep a copy of the Fact-Pak Study Guide nearby for reference. If you don't have one on hand, the summary below provides an overview of the questions to help you understand the origin of these devotions.

Crucifixion of Jesus (Isaiah 53:5)

- 217: The people asked Pilate to release Barabbas instead of Jesus.
- 218: "Golgotha" means "The Place of the Skull."
- 219: Pilate placed the title "[Jesus of Nazareth], the King of the Jews" on Jesus' cross.
- 220: Jesus died by crucifixion, being nailed to a cross.

Jesus' Death (Matthew 27:54)

- 221: When Jesus was crucified, the sun became dark for three hours, and there was an earthquake.
- 222: The Roman officer in charge of Jesus' execution declared, "This man truly was the Son of God!"
- 223: Jesus was buried by Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. **The Resurrection of Jesus (Matthew 28:6)**
- 224: Mary Magdalene was the 1st person to see Jesus after His resurrection.
- 225: An angel rolled away the stone, making a way for the women to enter the tomb of Jesus.
- 226: Thomas was the disciple who at first doubted Jesus' resurrection. Ascension and Early Church (Acts 1:8-9)
- 227: After forty days of walking and talking with His apostles following His death, Jesus was taken up into a cloud until they could no longer see Him.
- 228: Matthias was chosen to replace Judas as an apostle.
- 229: About 120 people waited together in an upstairs room for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

The Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:38)

- 230: On the Day of Pentecost, God gave the Church the Holy Spirit.
- 231: The prophet Joel foretold the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.
- 232: About three thousand people were saved as a result of Peter's sermon on the Day of Pentecost.

Responsibility of the Church (Acts 3:6)

- 233: QQ Peter told the lame man at the temple gate, "I don't have any silver or gold for you. But I'll give you what I have. In the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, get up and walk!"
- 234: The sin of Ananias and Sapphira was that they lied to the Holy Spirit.

Prayer, Praise, and Worship

Bible Verse

"Come, let us tell of the Lord's greatness; let us exalt His name together." – Psalm 34:3 (NLT)

Story

Mia loved spending time with her best friend. They talked about everything, laughed together, and always encouraged each other. "It's great to have someone to **talk to and share life with!**" she said.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad said, "Do you know that **God wants to talk with us, too**? That's what **prayer is—talking with God** just like you talk to a friend."

Mia tilted her head. "So, I can talk with God about anything?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "And when we talk with God, we should also **praise Him—which** means we thank Him for all He is and all He has done."

Dad added, "And worship is even deeper—it's when we adore and exalt God just for who He is."

Mia smiled. "So, prayer is talking with God, praise is thanking Him, and worship is loving Him with all my heart?"

"Exactly!" Dad said. "God loves when we **talk to Him, praise Him, and worship Him** every day!"

Faith Connection

Prayer is **talking with God**, just like we talk with a friend. **Praise is thanking God** for all He has done, and **worship is adoring Him** for who He is. **God loves to hear from us, and we grow closer to Him when we pray, praise, and worship!**

Discuss It

Why do you think **God wants us to talk to Him**? How can we **praise and worship God every day**?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for always listening when I pray. Help me to praise You for all You've done and worship You with all my heart. Amen.

Live It

This week, **spend extra time talking to God** in prayer. Take a moment each day to **thank Him for something (praise)** and to **worship Him for who He is**!

Sin, Repentance, Sanctification

Bible Verse

"But now you are free from the power of sin and have become slaves of God. Now you do those things that lead to holiness and result in eternal life." – Romans 6:22 **Story**

Mia and her little brother, Noah, were playing outside when Noah saw a **shortcut through a muddy field**. "Let's go this way!" he said.

Mia shook her head. "That path leads to a mess. We should stay on the sidewalk." Noah ignored her and ran into the field. But soon, his shoes got stuck in the mud, and he had to turn back.

That night, during family devotions, their dad read about **sin, repentance, and sanctification**.

- Sin is refusing to do God's will—according to the Bible and the Holy Spirit (1 John 3:4).
- **Repentance means having a change of mind, heart, and direction**—turning away from sin and back to God (Acts 3:19).
- Sanctification is being separated from sin and set apart to serve God choosing to walk in His ways (1 Thessalonians 4:3).

Mia smiled. "So, sin is like taking the wrong path, and repentance is realizing you need to turn around?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "And sanctification is choosing to stay on the right path and follow God every day."

Noah sighed. "I learned my lesson! I'll choose the right path next time." Dad added, "That's what God wants for us—to turn from sin and follow Him!"

Faith Connection

Sin is choosing to disobey God. Repentance is when we realize we're going the wrong way, change our hearts, and turn back to God. Sanctification is when we stay on the right path, choosing to live for God every day. When we follow Jesus, we are set apart to serve Him!

Discuss It

Why do you think **repentance is important** when we make mistakes? How can **sanctification help us grow closer to God** every day?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for helping me turn away from sin. Help me to repent when I go the wrong way and stay close to You as I follow Your path. Amen.

Live It

This week, think about an area of your life where you need to follow God's way instead of your own. Pray and ask God to help you turn back to Him and walk in His ways!

Crucifixion of Jesus

Bible Verse

"He was pierced for our rebellion, crushed for our sins. He was beaten so we could be whole. He was whipped so we could be healed." – Isaiah 53:5 (NLT) Story

Noah and his classmates were playing a game when **someone else took credit for his work**. "That's not fair!" Noah thought. But instead of arguing, he stayed quiet, even though he **knew he didn't deserve it.**

That night, during family devotions, Noah's dad read about **Jesus' trial and crucifixion**:

- The people asked Pilate to release Barabbas, a criminal, instead of Jesus (Matthew 27:20-21).
- Jesus was taken to Golgotha, which means "The Place of the Skull," to be crucified (Matthew 27:33).
- Pilate placed a sign on Jesus' cross that read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews" (John 19:19).
- Jesus was nailed to the cross and died for our sins (Luke 23:33-34).

Noah frowned. "So, Jesus took the punishment **even though He didn't do anything wrong?**"

"Yes," Mom said. "The people chose to free Barabbas, but Jesus chose to die for us."

Dad added, "Even the place of His crucifixion, **Golgotha**, reminds us of how serious sin is—but Jesus **took our punishment because He loves us.**"

Noah sighed. "That must have hurt so much."

"Yes," Mom said. "But Jesus was willing to die because He knew it would save us. His sacrifice means we can be forgiven and have eternal life."

Faith Connection

Even though Jesus was innocent, the people chose to release Barabbas instead of Him. He was taken to Golgotha, where He was nailed to a cross and died for our sins. Pilate placed a sign on His cross that read, "The King of the Jews"—and He truly is our King, who died to save us.

Discuss It

Why do you think Jesus **chose to die**, even though He was innocent? How does knowing **Jesus took our punishment** change the way we follow Him?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for **dying for my sins** so I can be forgiven. Help me to **trust You, love You, and live for You every day.** Amen.

Live It

This week, take time to **thank Jesus for His sacrifice**. Read **Luke 23** and remember that **Jesus' love for us is so great that He gave His life** to save us!

Jesus' Death

Bible Verse

"The Roman officer and the other soldiers at the crucifixion were terrified by the earthquake and all that had happened. They said, 'This man truly was the Son of God!'" – Matthew 27:54 (NLT)

Story

Mia and her family were outside when **a huge thunderstorm** rolled in. The sky turned dark, and loud thunder shook the house. "That was powerful!" Mia said, feeling small compared to the storm.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about what happened when **Jesus died on the cross**:

- The sun became dark for three hours, and an earthquake shook the land (Matthew 27:45, 51).
- The Roman officer in charge of Jesus' execution saw these signs and declared, "This man truly was the Son of God!" (Matthew 27:54).

• Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus buried Jesus in a tomb (John 19:38). Mia tilted her head. "So, even nature reacted when Jesus died?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "The darkness and earthquake showed how serious and powerful His death was. It wasn't just a normal event—it was the moment Jesus gave His life to save the world."

Dad added, "Even the **Roman officer**, who wasn't a follower of Jesus, realized the truth. **He saw what happened and believed Jesus really was the Son of God.**" Mia thought for a moment. "And after Jesus died, **His friends buried Him**?" "Yes," Mom said. "**Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus**, two religious leaders who followed Jesus in secret, **took a stand and buried Him in a tomb.**"

Mia smiled. "So even in sadness, some people chose to believe and follow Jesus?" "Exactly," Dad said. "Even though Jesus died, God's plan was still at work!"

Faith Connection

When Jesus died on the cross, the sun became dark for three hours, and an earthquake shook the land. A Roman officer realized the truth and declared, "This man truly was the Son of God!" Jesus' body was buried by Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. Even in sadness, God's plan was still unfolding!

Discuss It Why do you think the **earthquake and darkness** happened when Jesus died? How did the **Roman officer's words** show that people were starting to believe in Jesus?

Prayer Dear Jesus, thank You for **Your sacrifice on the cross**. Help me to always remember that **You are the Son of God**, and that even in sadness, **Your plan is at work.** Amen.

Live It This week, take time to thank Jesus for His sacrifice. Read Matthew 27:45-54 and think about how God's power was shown, even in Jesus' death.

Faith, Redemption, Justification

Bible Verse

"Therefore, since we have been made right in God's sight by faith, we have peace with God because of what Jesus Christ our Lord has done for us." – Romans 5:1 NLT Story

Noah accidentally **broke his friend's toy** while they were playing. He felt awful and said, "I'll save my money and buy a new one." But his friend's mom smiled and said, "It's okay, I already replaced it. You don't have to pay for it."

That night, during family devotions, Noah's dad read **Romans 5:1**, which talks about **being justified by faith**.

- Faith is complete trust in God, believing that He keeps His promises.
- Redemption means Jesus paid the price for our salvation—we could never do it on our own.
- Justification means that when we accept Jesus, God sees us as if we had never sinned.

Noah tilted his head. "So, I didn't have to pay for the broken toy because someone else already did?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "That's like **redemption—Jesus paid for our sins** when He died on the cross."

Dad continued, "And when we **put our faith in Jesus**, we are **justified**—which means **God looks at us as if we had never sinned**."

Noah smiled. "So, I just have to trust Jesus, and He makes me right with God?" "Exactly," Mom said. "It's not about earning salvation—it's a free gift through Jesus."

Faith Connection

Faith means completely trusting God. Redemption is the price Jesus paid for our salvation, and justification means that when we accept Jesus, God sees us as if we had never sinned. We don't have to earn salvation—Jesus already paid for it!

Discuss It

Why is **faith in God's promises** so important? How does it make you feel knowing that **Jesus paid for your sins, and God sees you as forgiven**?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for **paying the price for my sins**. Help me to **trust You completely** and remember that **because of You, I am forgiven.** Amen.

Live It

This week, think about what it means to have faith in Jesus. Read Romans 5:1 and remember that because of Jesus, we are made right with God!

Unchanging Grace

Bible Verse

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." – Hebrews 13:8 (NLT) Story

Mia loved visiting her grandparents' house. No matter how much time passed, **their home always felt warm, welcoming, and full of love**. "I like that some things never change," she said.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about how **God showed John a** vision of the last days while he was on the isle of Patmos. "Even when the world changes, **God remains the same**," he said.

Mia tilted her head. "So, even though John saw **big changes coming**, God was still in control?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "The Bible says God is immutable, which means He never changes. His love, power, and promises are always the same."

Dad added, "And one of the greatest things about God is His grace. Grace is God's gift of love and forgiveness—it's not something we can earn or deserve."

Mia grinned. "So, even though **everything around us changes, God's love never does**?"

"Exactly," Dad said. "And because of **His grace**, we can **trust Him no matter what** happens."

Faith Connection

While on **Patmos, God gave John a vision** about the **last days**, but even in uncertain times, **God never changes**. He is **immutable**, meaning **He is always the same**. His **grace** is a **gift of love and forgiveness**—not something we earn. **No matter what happens, we can trust in God's unchanging love!**

Discuss It

Why do you think it's important that **God never changes**? How does knowing that **grace is a gift** make you feel about God's love?

Prayer

Dear Jesus, thank You for **never changing** and always loving me. Help me to **trust in Your grace** and remember that **You are in control no matter what happens.** Amen.

Live It

This week, take time to **thank God for His unchanging love**. When you notice something changing around you, remember **God's promises always stay the same!**

Jesus' Resurrection

Bible Verse

"He isn't here! He is risen from the dead, just as he said would happen." – Matthew 28:6 (NLT)

Story Mia and her brother, Noah, were playing hide-and-seek. When Mia couldn't find Noah, she checked the closet where she thought he was hiding. "He's not here!" she called out. Noah laughed from behind the couch.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about the morning **Jesus rose** from the dead.

- An angel rolled away the stone, and when the women arrived at the tomb, they saw that Jesus was not there! (Matthew 28:2-6).
- Mary Magdalene was the first person to see Jesus alive after His resurrection (John 20:14-16).
- Thomas doubted at first, saying he wouldn't believe unless he saw Jesus' wounds (John 20:24-29).

Mia tilted her head. "So, just like I said 'He's not here' when I couldn't find Noah, the angel said '**Jesus isn't here—He is risen!**"

"Yes!" Mom said. "The angel **rolled away the stone** to show that Jesus **wasn't in the tomb—He was alive!**"

Dad continued, "And Mary Magdalene was the first person to see Jesus after He rose from the dead. Jesus loved and honored her by letting her be the first to tell others the good news."

Noah frowned. "But Thomas didn't believe it at first?"

"No," Mom said. "He wanted **proof**. But when Jesus appeared and showed him His hands and side, Thomas believed."

Noah grinned. "So, Jesus is patient with us even when we **have doubts**?" "Yes!" Dad said. "Jesus told Thomas, **'Blessed are those who believe without seeing.'** That includes us today—we believe because of the truth in God's Word."

Faith Connection An angel rolled away the stone to show that Jesus was alive.

• Mary Magdalene was the first to see Jesus after His resurrection.

• Thomas doubted at first but believed when Jesus showed him proof. Even today, we believe in Jesus' resurrection, trusting God's Word and knowing that He is alive forever!

Discuss It Why do you think Jesus chose **Mary Magdalene** to be the first person to see Him alive? How does Thomas' story help us when we **struggle with doubt**?

Prayer Dear Jesus, thank You for **rising from the dead** and showing us Your power over sin and death. Help me to **believe and trust in You** even when I don't see everything clearly. Amen.

Live It This week, tell someone the story of Jesus' resurrection. Remember that even when we have doubts, we can trust God's and believe that Jesus is alive!

Ascension and Early Church

Bible Verse

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere– in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. After saying this, he was taken up into a cloud while they were watching, ..." – Acts 1:8-9 (NLT)

Story

Liam's grandparents came to visit for two weeks. They played games, told stories, and had so much fun. But when it was time for them to leave, Liam felt sad. "I don't want you to go," he said.

His grandpa smiled. "Don't worry, we'll see each other again, and we'll always be thinking about you!"

That night, during family devotions, Liam's dad read about **Jesus' ascension**. **For forty days after His death, Jesus walked and talked with His disciples** Acts 1:3.

- Then Jesus was taken up into a cloud until they could no longer see Him (Acts 1:9).
- The disciples chose Matthias to replace Judas as an apostle (Acts 1:26).
- About 120 believers gathered in an upstairs room, waiting for the Holy Spirit. Liam tilted his head. "So, after Jesus rose from the dead, He stayed for forty days before going back to heaven?"

"Yes," Mom said. "He **taught His disciples** about **God's kingdom** and prepared them for what was coming next."

Dad continued, "Then Jesus **ascended into heaven**, but He promised to send the **Holy Spirit** to help them."

Liam smiled. "And they **waited together in an upstairs room** for the **Holy Spirit** to come?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "And while they were waiting, they **chose Matthias** to replace Judas as an apostle. **God was preparing them** for the start of the Church!"

Faith Connection For forty days, Jesus walked and talked with His disciples before ascending into heaven. His followers waited in an upstairs room for the Holy Spirit, and Matthias was chosen to replace Judas. Even though Jesus left, He gave His followers hope—He would send the Holy Spirit to help them!

Discuss It Why do you think Jesus **stayed forty days** before returning to heaven? How does knowing that Jesus **sent the Holy Spirit** help us today?

Prayer Dear Jesus, thank You for **teaching Your disciples** before You returned to heaven. Help me to **trust Your plan** and remember that **You are always with me** through the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Live It This week, read Acts 1 and think about how the disciples waited for the Holy Spirit. Just like they trusted God's timing, pray and ask God to help you trust Him in every part of your life!

Bible Verse

"We love each other because He loved us first." - 1 John 4:19 (NLT)

Story

Noah was riding his **bike** when his dad stopped him. "You forgot your **helmet!**" his dad said. "It protects your head and keeps you safe."

That night, during family devotions, Noah's dad read about **the Helmet of Salvation from Ephesians 6.**

- 249: Luke wrote the Book of Acts.
- 250: Luke, a doctor.
- 252: Aquila and Priscilla, tentmakers, assisted Paul at Corinth.
- 251: QQ Paul told the Philippian jailer, "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved, along with everyone in your household."

Suffering for Jesus

Bible Verse

"The apostles left the high council rejoicing that God had counted them worthy to suffer disgrace for the name of Jesus." – Acts 5:41 (NLT)

Story

Mia's soccer team lost their championship game. Even though they played their best, the other team won. Mia expected her coach to be upset, but instead, he smiled and said, "You worked hard and gave your best—that's what really matters." That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about **the apostles being beaten for preaching about Jesus. Instead of being angry or afraid, they rejoiced because they were counted worthy to suffer for Jesus.**

Mia tilted her head. "Why would they be happy about suffering?"

"Because they knew they were doing the right thing," Mom said. "They were sharing the truth about Jesus, and even though it was hard, they **trusted God.**" Dad continued, "One of Jesus' followers, **Stephen, was the first person to die for his faith**. Noah was playing a video game where he had to choose between **two paths**. At first, he followed the wrong path and kept losing. Then he realized, *I need to go the right way if I want to win!*

That night, during family devotions, Noah's dad read about **Saul of Tarsus**. **Saul was on his way to Damascus to arrest Christians** because he thought they were wrong. But on the way, **a bright light from heaven flashed around him, and Jesus spoke to him.**

Noah tilted his head. "So, Saul was **going the wrong way in life**, and Jesus **stopped him and showed him the truth**?"

"Yes!" Mom said. "At first, Saul thought he was doing the right thing. But when Jesus appeared to him, he realized he was completely wrong."

Bible Verse

"So we are Christ's ambassadors; God is making his appeal through us...." – 2 Corinthians 5:20 (NLT)

Story

Mia's school was holding a **food drive** to help families in need. The teacher asked for volunteers to **deliver food to different neighborhoods**. Mia and her friend Noah raised their hands. "We'll go!" they said.

That night, during family devotions, Mia's dad read about **Paul's missionary** journeys and how he traveled to different places to share the Good News about Jesus.

"Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved, along with everyone in your household." – Acts 16:31 (NLT)

Story
